A message from the Mayor

Marulan Water

Earlier this month, there was a lot of comment and concerns expressed about the colour and quality of the town water in Marulan. While the immediate problem has now been addressed, I wanted Marulan residents to know that I hear and understand these concerns and now want to take this opportunity to talk about the current system, and the plans for the future.

The longer term Marulan residents would remember that the current filtration system was installed in 1998 and from time to time, has struggled to process the water supplied, particularly following rain events.

Residents have nevertheless, appreciated and respect the current reticulated water supply system.

A modern, improved town water supply system is required, however to date, it has also been recognised that such an upgrade (estimated to cost \$5-\$10M) has been beyond the financial capacity of the community. This cost is not known and will depend on what components of the existing plant can be retained as part of the future plant.

Be assured that this need has not “been forgotten”, or “fallen on deaf ears”, and certainly has nothing to do with “politics”, as has been touted on Facebook. But it does have everything to do with 1. Affordability and 2. Priorities.

In regard to affordability, Council have been working toward raising the required funding, and you might recall that in 2017, a new water pricing structure was introduced with provision made in the long term plans to provide an upgraded water treatment facility for the Marulan Township. However this new pricing structure will be insufficient to fund the complete upgrade that a modern and growing community like Marulan deserves. So Council will be making requests for financial assistance as well as contributing from the Council funding pool of the wider region.

It is incorrect and unfair of critics to claim that all the Goulburn Mulwaree Council money gets spent on Goulburn – certainly, a greater proportion does, but that is obviously where we have the greatest proportion of our population, who provide the greatest proportion of the Council's income. It is relevant!

In order to generate the funding required, the new pricing actually depends on the users of the Goulburn city water services to subsidise the operation and future provision of a system for Marulan. For a replacement system, it clearly takes some years to accumulate the capital required to actually proceed with the upgrade works

The Marulan community has fared pretty well, especially under this current Council. A quick analysis of Council income from the Marulan district over the last financial year, shows that (approximately) \$1.46 million was collected in fees, property and water rates. Over these recent years (Since 1 July 18), and apart from subsidising the Marulan water, the community has also seen considerable capital expenditure of Council funds across many areas, eg:

- Water Treatment Plant Renewal Works - \$93,604
- Waste Water Treatment Plant Feasibility & Concept Design (In Progress) - \$125,714
- Tony Onions Park (Amenities) - \$101,000
- Waste Management Centre - \$208,000
- Brayton Road Rehabilitation - \$121,500
- Brayton Rd (Haulage Route) - \$510,000
- Marulan South Road (Haulage Route) - \$71,000
- Footpaths - \$24,500
- Village plan and discretionary fund - Annual allocation of \$27,000
- Street scaping – \$49,500

- Resealing and rehab of George Street \$144,000
- The urban and fringe housing strategy \$134,000

In addition to this the Marulan Water Treatment plant also requires the replacement of membranes every 5-6 years at a cost of \$70,000.

The current financial budget makes provision to fund a review and the development of a concept for the upgrade of the water treatment plant. After that, detailed planning and design will be required, formal approvals etc obtained, and State/Federal grant funding sought to compliment the Council/community contribution.

And while all that work has been going on, Marulan has continued to develop and grow to the extent that the current sewerage system is now at capacity and the new Waste Water Treatment Plant is also required and is going to cost around \$13M. So the next question is priorities.

Council has chosen at this time to focus on a new Wastewater scheme in Marulan as this system is at capacity and does not meet modern environmental requirements. This project will replace the existing substandard common effluent drainage system that collects the effluent from the septic tanks for treatment. Our goal is to develop a modern, efficient and environmentally effective system that will allow Marulan to continue to thrive and grow. This upgrade does not have any committed Government assistance so the total capital cost will be met by not only Marulan users of the scheme but other ratepayers in the region. Council chose to upgrade the wastewater scheme first otherwise all development in Marulan would have been placed on hold

Council cannot afford to upgrade both systems right now. There is a current reticulated water supply which can continue to supply the expected growth in the near future. However the WWTP can't, and unless this essential infrastructure is attended to now, there will be no capacity for new connections, and growth in Marulan will be stymied. So the WWTP project has to be completed first, and that work is currently planned, funded and will soon go out for tenders.

Unfortunately there is no quick fix - we know the issue/s; we continue to work on them and we will continue to consult with the community. I accept that this is a very brief summation of these two important aspects, but I hope that it provides some understanding of the way forward for residents of Marulan.

December President's Report



At a recent meeting someone asked me, what do the Chamber do? This prompted me to reflect over the past ten years, and look at some of the achievements.

These achievements have been made with the assistance of a number of organisations - Goulburn Mulwaree Council, Lions Club, Progress Association and other Groups in Marulan, and with the co-operation of all the Quarries in our area.

Ten years ago the population of Marulan was much smaller, and we as a group saw the need to build on Marulan's natural assets, and make it a visitor friendly town. We started with the historic signs on historic buildings in town, and then produced a Tour Guide of the town, being "The Marulan Meander".

We felt that the town needed more formal entrances and with the help of Boral, built two stonewall entrances.

Members and Council undertook a tree planting plan which encompassed the southern end of George Street, Goulburn Street, Portland Avenue and Brayton Road. We also set up a volunteer group who maintained the Main Street.

For local businesses we produced three Business Directories over five years and these were distributed to all residents as an easy guide to services, goods and businesses available in Marulan.

To attract visitors to Marulan, we instituted the annual Kite Festival, and underwrote the event. A Clockmaker's Weekend was held in line with the 150 Meridian with the assistance of Gunlake.

The Chamber works closely with all tiers of Government, Local, State and Federal. With local government, we have seen footpaths down the northern end of George Street, Brayton Road and Goulburn Street. With State Government grants, the toilet block in Tony Onions Park was replaced as well as the BBQ.

Our strong support of the Quarrying industry has seen them work with Chamber to improve facilities in town. The Chamber sees the Quarries as the backbone of the town, providing employment, new residents, therefore resulting in increased home values and making Marulan a good village to move to.

The latest evidence of this is Holcim's work on the Rotunda in Tony Onions Park, and we thank them for doing such a great job, and fulfilling this commitment to the Chamber.

The Quarries have also financed the BBQ Shelter, lighting of the tennis Court, and work on the extension of the Meridian Park.

The Chamber is a member of the Village Committee, and this committee has voted for the improvements to the Cricket Ground, and new works on the Soccer Field.

Over the past ten years we have achieved a great deal, and look forward to working with the Organisations in the village for further innovations. All of our members are there to service the township, and the Chamber congratulates all of them for their support and what they add to our community.

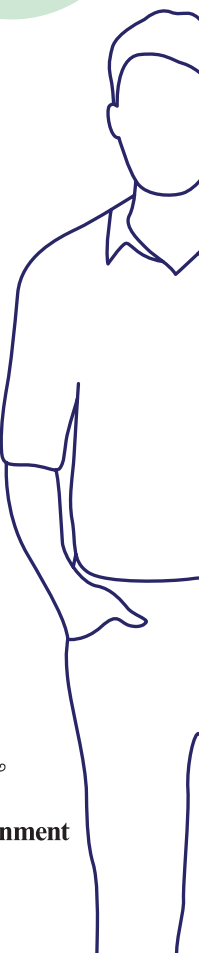
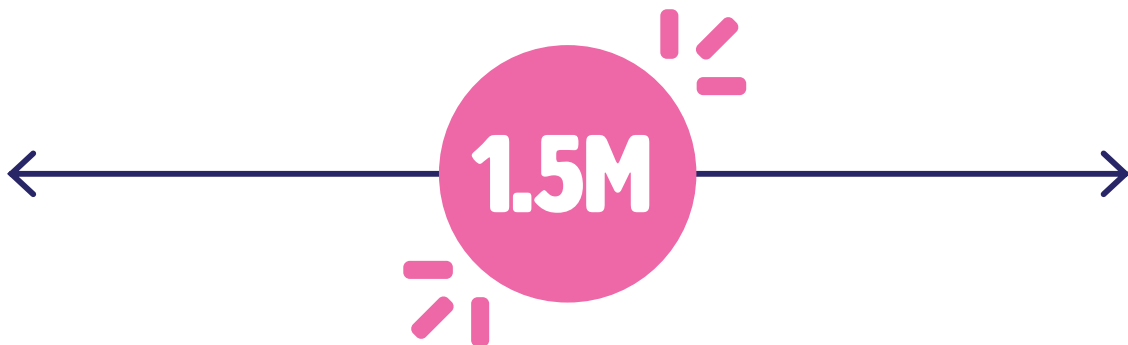
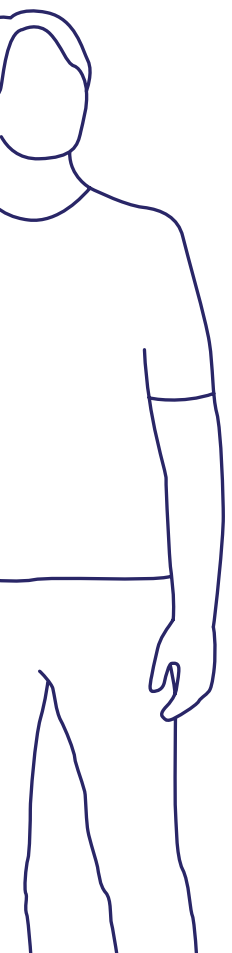

GUNLAKE MARULAN QUARRY

Overview

The Gunlake Group (Gunlake), consisting of Gunlake Concrete and Gunlake Quarries, is an Australian family-owned business that is expanding to meet customer and market demands, across the Greater Sydney area, Southern Highlands and Southern Tablelands. Gunlake operates the Gunlake Quarry, approximately 7 km north-west of Marulan.

Gunlake is lodging an application to modify the quarry's current State Significant Development (SSD) consent to allow increased truck movements. Gunlake is also lodging a separate new SSD application for the Gunlake Quarry Continuation Project which would allow increased quarry production. Approval of these applications would allow the quarry to meet the increased demand projected for its high-quality products.

Modification application

The quarry's consent limits the average and maximum number of trucks that can be dispatched from the quarry each day. The modification application will seek to increase these limits on the Primary Transport Route (Brayton, Ambrose and Red Hills Roads from the Quarry entrance to the Hume Highway).

There will be no changes to the disturbance area, the pit depth, hours of operation, blasting frequency, or truck movements on the Secondary Transport Route, ie south of the Brayton Road/Ambrose Road intersection and through Marulan – see *Figure 1* over page.

The quarry's consent was granted by the NSW Land & Environment Court and so the modification application is to be made to the court. Its approval would provide an interim solution to meeting demand while the Gunlake Quarry Continuation Project SSD application is prepared, lodged and assessed.

Gunlake Quarry Continuation Project

The Gunlake Quarry Continuation Project application will be for a new SSD approval for the quarry. The application will be made through the NSW Department of Planning, Industry and Environment (DPIE).



The application will seek to:

- increase quarrying and processing rates;
- increase the workforce;
- increase truck movements from the site along the Primary Transport Route (Brayton, Ambrose and Red Hills Roads from the Quarry entrance to the Hume Highway); and
- extend the approval for quarry operations for 30 years to 2051.

There will be no changes to the disturbance area, the pit depth, hours of operation, blasting frequency, or the truck movements on the Secondary Transport Route, ie south of the Brayton Road/Ambrose Road intersection and through Marulan.

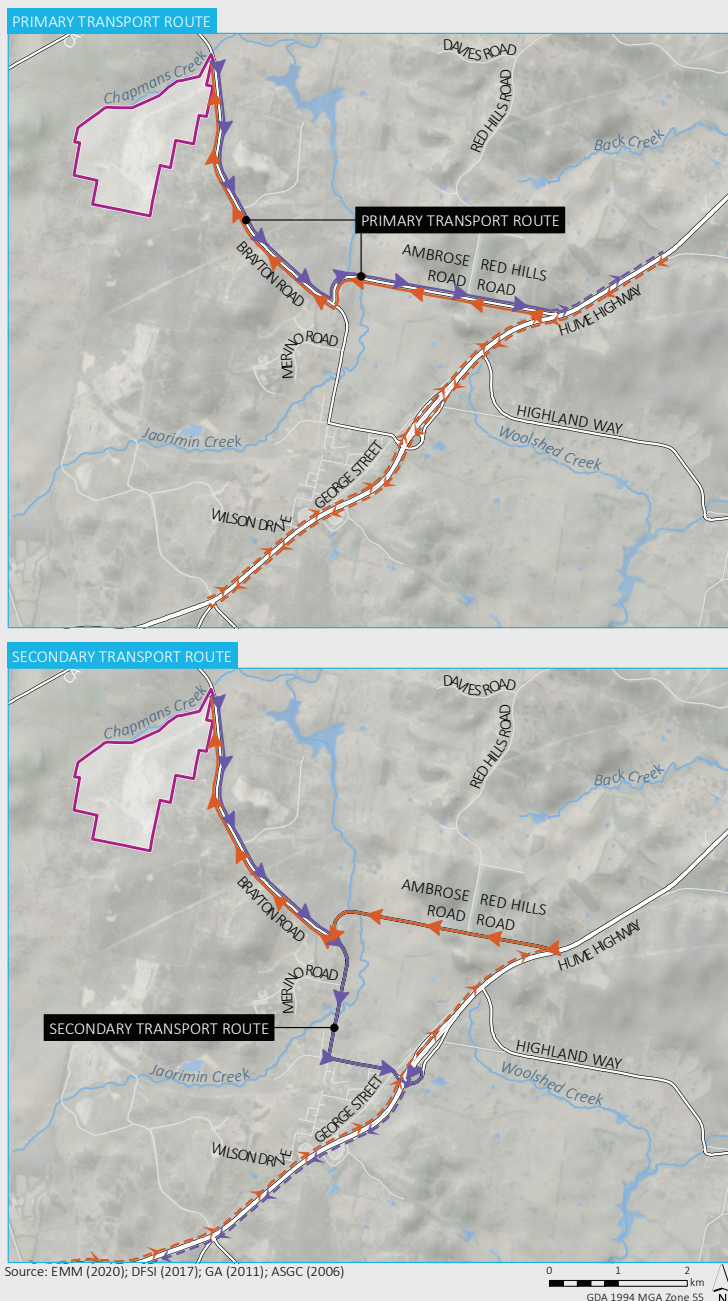
Over the next few months Gunlake Quarries will be preparing an environmental impact statement (EIS), to accompany the SSD application for the Gunlake Quarry Continuation Project. Technical studies that assess the environmental, economic and social impacts of the Gunlake Quarry Continuation Project will form part of the EIS.

The EIS will be placed on public exhibition. The community and other stakeholders will be invited to make a formal submission on the exhibited EIS. Gunlake will then provide responses to these submissions in a report to DPIE who will then prepare an assessment report.

As a SSD, the consent authority will be a delegate of the Minister of Planning or the Independent Planning Commission (IPC).

Employment opportunities

The quarry currently employs about 52 people full-time and about 20 contractors. There will be a small increase in the quarry's workforce if the proposed modification is approved. There will be larger increases in the workforce associated with the Gunlake Quarry Continuation Project.

In addition, around 200 contract truck drivers deliver products from the quarry. The proposed projects will provide further work for these drivers and opportunities for more drivers.

Your feedback is an important part of the planning approvals process and assists in ensuring that the EIS addresses your issues and/or concerns and acknowledges the benefits to the community.

Gunlake will be conducting a range of engagement activities between November 2020 and February 2021 to ensure the local community and interested stakeholders are informed about the project and to collect their input. These engagement activities may include:


- meetings with key stakeholders;
- letters to residents on both the Primary and Secondary Transport Routes;
- community newsletters;
- community information sessions;
- webpage updates; and
- community email and phone number access for enquiries.

Gunlake will be holding a Community Information Session at the Marulan Memorial Hall on Friday 4th December 2020 from 2pm to 6pm.

As this will be a Covid Safe event, you will need to make an appointment to attend and convenient time slots will be allocated.

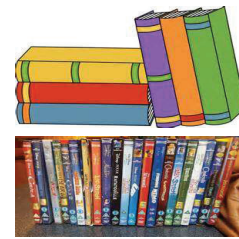

Southern Tablelands Rail User Group

After a long pause due to Covid 19 STRUG has now started to get back into the swing of things.

In late September or early October three mock up carriages for the new diesel train fleet arrived in containers and were taken straight to the EDI factory at Kelso, near Bathurst. STRUG requested an opportunity for Regional Rail Action NSW member groups to have an on site inspection. After being told for a week and a half that we would be contacted about an inspection of the carriages no contact had been made. Our Regional Rail Action spokesperson was eventually contacted and we were offered an opportunity to view a film of the carriages in a virtual meeting originally scheduled for November but which had to be put back to December because the film would not be ready in time. We have not been offered any extra time for the virtual meeting and we already had a full agenda.

The film is not the same as physically seeing the train as you can't see how comfortable the seats are, how easy it is to reverse them, Toilet facilities and see what sun protections the saloon windows offer from direct sun light. Travellers will know there isn't a lot of protection afforded by Endeavour windows. STRUG will continue to request an opportunity to physically inspect the carriages.

2020 ROUND 2 RECIPIENTS ANNOUNCED

The Veolia Mulwaree Trust will support 39 local community organisations with a wide range of local projects through \$270,483 in funding distributed recently.

Eighteen organisations have been successful through the Trust's grant program:

Tarago Public School will install bright new playground markings for education and fitness activities for its students throughout the playground with the help of a \$12,190 grant.

The Tarago Hall will have air-conditioning installed and the kitchen upgraded with a grant of \$50,785 from the Veolia Mulwaree Trust and the financial support of the **Tarago and District Progress Association (TADPA)**.

The Crescent School in Goulburn received a grant of \$24,687 to complete its Secure Sensory Walkways Project, providing an accessible and safe new playground area for students.

Community Links Wellbeing Inc in the Wollondilly area will provide musical instruments for music therapy sessions for its clients through a grant of \$1,514.

Students at **Oberon Public School** will soon enjoy improved outdoor facilities with the school undertaking the Magnificent Playground Project which the Trust has supported with \$9,831 in funding.

A grant of \$23,200 was presented to the **Tarago and District Show Society Inc** which will undertake a much-needed upgrade to the food and beverage outlet at Tarago Showground in time for next year's show.

Marulan Public School is excited to be installing new playground equipment which will be enjoyed by the students. The Trust will assist the school and its P&C to complete the project with a grant of \$11,000.

\$5,000 was presented to **Oberon Council** toward the Oberon Bicentenary Tapestries conservation framing project. The tapestries were a major local Bicentenary project and will be preserved for many more years of enjoyment by the local community.

Gunning Swimming Pool will undergo a major shade and seating project ready for the hot summer months, with the Trust contributing \$49,107 to **Upper Lachlan Shire Council** to assist with the improvements.

The Trust is pleased to support the **Hume Conservatorium of Music** with the fit out of its new multi-purpose Creative Precinct facility by providing \$10,000 toward the purchase of new seating.

Picton CWA members have been busy in lockdown creating poppy wreaths for six locations throughout the Wollondilly shire including local nursing homes and RSL Sub Branches. The Trust has supported their efforts by providing a grant of \$1,320 to provide six memorial boxes for the displays.

Tarago Pony Club which has recently reformed after many years will be able to update its equipment with the Veolia Mulwaree Trust supporting the group with a \$3,376 in funding.

A new electronic school sign will soon be installed to improve communications and promotions at **Goulburn East Public School** following a grant of \$12,000 provided by the Trust.

Tarago Sporting Association Inc will provide extra storage in the sports pavilion at Tarago Recreation Area through a grant of \$6,138.

Reedy Creek Equestrian Club will be able to transport its equipment to its many sites throughout the region with the Trust granting \$5,000 toward the purchase of a new trailer.

Wollondilly Pony Club Inc will undertake the much-needed refurbishment and upgrade of pony club cross country course at Tahmoor thanks to a \$12,305 Veolia Mulwaree Trust grant.

Nowra's Cerebral Palsy Alliance will purchase new Magic Carpet technology equipment to assist people with disabilities. The Trust has contributed \$5,000 toward the equipment.

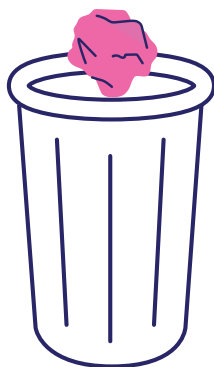
