The evolution of Anzac Day from 1915 until today



Australians have commemorated Anzac Day on 25 April Men, women and children line the streets in Brisbane to for more than a century, but the ceremonies and their watch the procession of the 41st Battalion on Anzac Day meanings have changed significantly since 1915.

ON THE MORNING of Sunday, 25 April 1915, Australian and New Zealand troops entered their first major engagement of World War I, stepping into battle on a small Turkish beach – in a moment that continues to ripple through Australian society more than 100 years on.

On that date in every year since, Australians have commemorated the actions of those men on the Gallipoli Peninsula, on a beach that would become known as Anzac Cove. Looking back at the ways Australians have marked Anzac Day in years gone by offers a frank reflection of changing Australian society and cultural identity over the past century, says Dr Carolyn Holbrook, a historian at Deakin University in Victoria.

"These kinds of myths and legends, they're a mirror," she says. "If you want to get a picture of Australian society, you can look at things like this because they reflect contemporary values."

1915: The dawn landing

The first Australians to approach Gallipoli were infantrymen from Queensland, South Australia and Western Australia. In the darkness before dawn, they left the battleships behind in the Aegean Sea and rowed toward the shores of 'Z beach'. Turkish forces opened fire before the boats reached land, forcing many of the men to launch themselves into the ocean to avoid the onslaught of bullets; the element of surprise lost.

When the survivors from this first wave eventually stepped onto the sand, they were sopping wet and disoriented – a state which would propagate throughout the day and the entire Gallipoli campaign.

By mid-morning, around 8000 Anzacs (Australian and New Zealand Army Corps) were ashore and had begun scrambling up the cliffs surrounding the beach to battle for the ridges. The day's actions resulted in a minimal gain for the Allies, and the Anzacs were forced to consolidate in the cove, with months of fighting ahead.

When the Sun had set on 25 April 2015, more than 600 Australians had lost their lives, and over 1000 had been injured. The list of the dead would grow to over 11,000 Anzacs by the end of the Gallipoli campaign.

Once news reached Australia that the Anzac troops had entered the war, excitement flowed through communities, and there were murmurings of the birth of the nation onto the global stage at last. The Great War played a definitive role in the formation of Australia's identity, more so than the Federation in 1901.

1916: The first Anzac Day

On 25 April 1916, small ceremonies were held around the world and throughout Australia to commemorate the Anzacs' entrance into the war and the lives of their fallen comrades. The details of these first Anzac services are slim, but historians suggest that services may have taken place in Albany in Western Australia and Brisbane and Rockhampton in Queensland, as well as on the Western Front.

There are also reports of a small service in Egypt, where the Anzac forces had been training before being summoned to Gallipoli one year earlier. Australia and the British Empire were still at war, so while Anzac events in 1916 commemorated those who fought and died at Gallipoli, there was also an emphasis on Australia's pride in entering the war –with continued recruitment in mind.

"It has always been political," says Dr Martin Crotty, a historian at the University of Queensland. Anzac commemorations have "suited political purposes right from 1916 when the first Anzac Day march was held in London and Australia, which were very much around trying to get more people to sign up to the war in 1916-1918," he says.

The first dawn services began in the 1920s, driven by returned soldiers and their families, with few other attendees. In the years after the war, "Anzac Day was about commemoration and remembering the dead and fallen mates, combined with a sense of pride for being soldiers and proving themselves," says Carolyn. "[The day] was very much tethered to the idea of the British Empire."

Early morning services were solemn, giving way to more upbeat afternoon celebrations, reflecting the pride felt by returned soldiers for their contribution on behalf of Australia to the Great War. By 25 April 1927, all states and territories had legislated for Anzac Day to become a public holiday, and it is believed the first continuous dawn service started in Sydney in 1928.

"1960: Anzac Day on the oval

The Anzac Day footy clash between Essendon and Collingwood is a significant event on the Anzac Day calendar, regularly drawing crowds of over 80,000. However, the idea was not always so popular.

The government prohibited all sporting games on Anzac Day for 44 years after the first Anzac Day in 1916. The ban was lifted in 1958 on the condition that games would start in the late afternoon so as not to interfere with Anzac services, and participating sporting clubs would donate to an Anzac Day Proceeds Fund. The first matches were held in 1960.

"There is an analogy between war and sport, people try and resist it, but there is," says Carolyn. "There's something about that intense bonding that happens in sports teams, and I'm sure it relates to mateship that happens in wartime where people bond very deeply."

After the clash each year, one player is recognised for best embodying the Anzac spirit – through 'skill, courage, self-sacrifice, teamwork and fair play – and is awarded the Anzac Medal.

The first Anzac clash between Essendon and Collingwood was on 25 April 1995, an idea conceived by Essendon Bombers coach Kevin Sheedy who said at the time, "We can never match the courage of people who went to war, but we can actually thank them with the way we play this game, with its spirit."

1960s-1980s: Vietnam protests and social rebellion

In the late 1960s, during the Vietnam War, anti-war protesters used Anzac Day events as a platform to make their voices heard, fighting against conscription and Australia's military involvement in general.

Over the next 20 years or so, Australians began to overturn society's established values and start questioning the relevance of Australia's war connection with the British Empire.

On 25 April 1981, about 500 protesters, mostly women, marched toward Anzac Parade in Canberra. At the head of the procession, women held a banner which read, 'In memory of all women of all countries raped in all wars. Police arrested more than 60 women.

Increased social and sexual rebellion and second-wave feminism led to calls for a new type of comradeship that didn't discriminate based on sex or race. "The entire meaning of Anzac Day had changed," says Carolyn.

As numbers dwindled at events throughout the 1980s, it was widely believed that Anzac Day commemorations were on the decline.

1990s: Political rekindling of the Anzac spirit

On 25 April 1990, Bob Hawke became the first Australian politician to visit Gallipoli, in what historians see as a major milestone in the recovery of Anzac Day.

In the hope of drumming up some nationalism in Australia and a boost in the polls, Hawke decided his government would pay to take Anzac veterans to Gallipoli for the 75th anniversary of the dawn landing.

After Hawke came Paul Keating – who, according to Carolyn, "was more interested in Kokoda and the Second World War" than Gallipoli – followed by John Howard. Howard was a huge proponent of Anzac Day commemorations and visited Gallipoli on 25 April 2000 and 2005.

"They sensed that acrimony towards Anzac Day since the Vietnam War was shifting, and they were right," says Carolyn. Renewed political interest and investment in Anzac Day had the desired effect, and the day of commemoration became popular once again.

This was supported by a controversial push for more Anzac material in the school curriculum, which was quickly labelled as propaganda by critics. The Anzac legend thrived once more throughout the late 1990s and early 21st century.

2010s: WWI centenary and 'Brandzac' Day

The Centenary commemorations of WWI gave rise to several questionable Anzac marketing campaigns, the most notorious of which was Woolworths' 'Fresh in Our Memories' campaign in 2015.

The Australian supermarket giant encouraged Australians to contribute photos of people affected by war to a picture generator, which would produce an image with their campaign slogan and the Woolworths logo overlayed. The powerful criticism from the Australian public was immediate and unrelenting. The push back suggested a line had been crossed.

"People don't blink an eye at [the commercialisation of] Christmas and Easter, but still think that Anzac is sacred," says Carolyn, who pointed out that Australia is spending more money on WWI Centenary commemorations than any other country.

Some historians believe Anzac Day events are now on the decline, although there will likely continue to be smaller dawn services and official events in the future.

"I think it's a ritual for older, traditional Australians, [who have] old values of mateship, egalitarianism and loyalty," says Martin, adding that while older Australians hold on to Anzac Day as a "reaction against globalisation", younger generations aren't as bothered.

Carolyn disagrees, instead of arguing that "it is young people who are responsible for the resurgence, and it's among older people that there is a big group of sceptics – the Baby Boomers who were heavily influenced by Vietnam War protests." "We reached Peak Anzac in 2015, sure, and there has been some backing off since then, but in terms of the dawn services and Anzac Day commemoration, it will remain huge for a good while yet," says Carolyn. "There is nothing better to take its place in terms of a national mythology."

Anzac Day's more positive modern adaptation has been to recognise and commemorate the often overlooked role that women, immigrants, and indigenous Australians played in the war. One powerful example is the production Black Diggers, which premiered at the Sydney Festival, telling the stories of the Aboriginal men who enlisted, whose sacrifices were ignored, and who were quickly forgotten upon their return.

BOB KIRK WATER UPDATE

As I discussed at length in my column in December, Council is aware of issues with water discolouration in Marulan. I want to reassure the community that water is tested daily and meets the Australian Drinking Water Guidelines.

Water discolouration predominantly occurs when we need to draw directly from the Wollondilly River. However, at present, we are drawing from the onsite storage dam, which does not have the same discolouration issue.

Work is also underway for a significant upgrade to the Marulan Water Treatment Plant, which occurs alongside a new Wastewater Treatment Plant, which will occur first to allow future growth and development in Marulan.

The cost of both developments will be in excess of \$18 million, and we expect to have both projects complete in the next three years.

Unfortunately, these are not plants that can be just dropped into place – the detailed designs need to specific to the area and the need, and construction will take time.

Rest assured, however, that this work is underway, and to say Council has prioritised this issue, so much, so we are drawing funding from the Goulburn ratepayers. Users of the Goulburn City water services will need to subsidise the operation and future provision of the systems in Marulan. Still, we feel that it is worthwhile to allow Marulan to continue to grow.

Marulan Lions Club 40 th Anniversary

In April I was honoured to attend the Marulan Lions Club 40 th anniversary dinner at the Marulan Hall. What a fantastic achievement for a small community organisation such as the Lions, who have contributed to countless projects and great initiatives in Marulan area over four decades. Community organisations are the lifeblood of our regional towns and cities. If you would like to give some of your time to a community organisation, I would highly recommend considering the Marulan Lions Club. Let's hope they continue for at least forty more years!



Terrain Solar - 150 MW Solar Farm

Terrain Solar is proposing to develop a 150MW solar farm plus an optional battery energy storage system with a potential capacity of up to 100MW hours on Carrick Road, which was a site where a solar project was formally proposed a few years ago.

The company has recently undertaken a scoping report for what will be known as the Marulan Solar Farm, to support a request to the Department of Planning, Industry & Environment for the Secretary's Environmental Assessment Requirements (SEARs).

The site is connected to the Hume Highway by Carrick Road, and is currently used for grazing purposes. Terrain Solar undertook consultation during the scoping report stage, sending a community notification letter to 50 landowners within proximity of the site. Key groups such as the Chamber of Commerce and Towrang Progress Association have also been contacted regarding the project.

Further consultation will be undertaken as this project progresses, but I wanted to ensure the community are aware, as it is important you have your say through the planning process.

Free recyclable waste weekend

Goulburn Mulwaree Council is encouraging residents to begin to prepare for the free bulky household recyclables disposal weekend, which has reverted to its usual date on the first weekend of May.

The Waste Management Centre in Marulan will be open from 7 am to 4 pm on both Saturday 1 st and Sunday 2 nd May to cater for the expected larger crowds

Following a year in which we all took advantage of lockdowns to clean out the home, we encourage you to prepare now and plan your trip ahead of time. The household recyclables weekend is a great chance to dispose of those larger household appliances for recycling. Mattresses have traditionally been an issue for our region with dumping, but there is no excuse for this when they will be accepted during this weekend at no cost.

We do expect some line-ups throughout the day as it's always a popular weekend, but will

have plenty of staff on hand to keep things moving smoothly.

Residents can dispose of up to two mattresses, 2 fridges/freezers, 1 airconditioner, up to 1m3 of e-waste (computers, televisions, printers, fax machines and computer accessories only), and/or up-to 2m3 of clean steel items (including electrical appliances with an electrical lead) per property, free of charge at Council & waste centres.

All loads must be transported to one of Council & waste centres, and only domestic items will be accepted. All waste/items outside of those listed above will be charged the appropriate fee for disposal.

APRIL PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The Chamber is moving closer to the total revamp of its monthly magazine Discover Marulan. We ask that all residents who have items of interest and upcoming events forward details to the Editor of Discover Marulan to maximise publicity through the magazine.

The Chamber has been pursuing authorities regarding Marulan's water quality. The Council have responded through the Marulan Facebook page.

Pressure will continue by Chamber to the relevant authorities, and it is suggested that residents can also contact their local, state and federal representatives with their concerns.

The discussion also took place on the proposed waste incinerator on Jerrarra Road. As this would be a significant development, the state government will decide if this goes ahead, and any complaints should be referred to the state representative.

It was agreed that Jerrarra Road is disintegrating, and any further vehicle use would exacerbate the situation. As fees from Mulriquip are not sufficient to rectify the road, this would fall on Council or the proposed developers to rectify.

Marulan Bypass Pavement Rehabilitation

Transport for NSW is planning to rehabilitate sections of the concrete pavement surface on the Hume Highway at Marulan. The project is starting in mid-2021 and be completed by mid-2023, weather permitting.

PROJECT BACKGROUND

The Australian and NSW governments have provided a total of \$35 million to replace sections of the concrete pavement surface on the Hume Highway at Marulan. The Marulan bypass, which was built in 1986 as part of the Hume Highway upgrade, is 7.5 kilometres long and is located about 31km north of Goulburn.

Due to an increasing number of vehicles using the highway each year, the condition of the road has deteriorated and ongoing maintenance expenses are increasing.

To improve driving conditions for motorists the existing concrete pavement will be replaced with a flexible pavement with a thick asphalt surface. The work will be completed in stages, with the worst sections being replaced first.

Delivering this project has been identified as a regional priority and work is expected to start in mid-2021 and be completed by mid-2023, weather permitting

Goulburn Mulwaree Council advises that we have had to make changes to address potential water quality issues at the source in Marulan, and are now again drawing water from the Wollondilly River.

The water delivered to households will meet all Australian Drinking Water Guidelines. Levels of discolouration look to be low, however there is potential for changes in water colour over the next few days.

We will continue to monitor the situation and will make changes accordingly to address these issues. Residents of Marulan who do experience discolouration are encouraged to contact Council directly via 4823 4444.

What's proposed?

Jerrara Power Pty Ltd is proposing to build and operate a facility at 974 Jerrara Road, Bungonia to process up to 330,000 tonnes of residual household, commercial and industrial waste each year to generate sustainable baseload electricity.

Residual waste, not suitable for recycling, would be sourced locally and from the Sydney basin and transported to the facility where the waste would be thermally processed at high temperature using world-leading moving grate combustion technology.


The heat from combustion would boil water to create steam. The steam drives a turbine connected to a generator to produce reliable baseload electricity. This would be fed into the grid to power homes and businesses.

Once fully operational, the facility would feed an average of 28 megawatts of power to the grid. This is enough electricity to supply 43,000* homes



ANZAC DAY



After ANZAC Day 2020, which could only be marked with candlelight vigils at the end of driveways, ANZAC Day 2021 saw a welcome return to normality.

A crowd of over 100 residents gathered at Tallong War Memorial to honour servicemen and women both past and present, particularly those from Tallong and the surrounding district. As Master of Ceremonies, Geoff Kettle welcomed all comers and addresses were given by Deputy Mayor of Goulburn Mulwaree Council, Peter Walker and the Principal of Tallong Public School, Emily Morrow. Angus S. and Saxon S., two members of Tallong Public School's Student Representative Council, then read verses from "We Are All Australians Now" by A.B. (Banjo) Paterson, a poem originally written as an open letter to the troops in 1915.

Representatives of local organisations were invited to lay their wreaths and, following. Tallong tradition, any community member who wished to place a poppy on the War Memorial, in remembrance, was encouraged to do so.





FAREWELL TO ALAN AND CHERYL WESTON

At the morning tea, which followed the ANZAC service, the Tallong community took the opportunity to bid a special farewell to Alan and Cheryl Weston, who have moved to Moss Vale. Both are well known and active community members.

Alan, in fact, lived in Tallong as a young boy in a house in Bumballa St, which subsequently burned in the 1965 Chatsbury bushfire. He and his siblings attended Tallong Public School for several years, and it was there that Alan developed his artistic abilities. Alan and Cheryl returned to Tallong in 2003, buying a property in the Tallong Park Estate. Both were active members of the St Stephens Anglican Church congregation, with Alan becoming Rector's Warden and Church Leader. Alan was also involved in the Explorers Club at Tallong Public School, a popular after school activity for several years, offering afternoon tea, games and religious education under the auspices of the Anglican Parish of Sutton Forest. In recent years Alan has been a member of the Tallong Picnic and Recreation Reserve Trust and was also responsible for the restoration of the Big Apple and all the historical signage in Tallong Memorial Park.

Alan and Cheryl have both been long term members of the Tallong RFS, Alan for 13 years serving as truck driver and firefighter and in more recent times as Secretary and then President. Cheryl was catering officer for 3 years, including during the 2019- 2020 bushfires - no mean task. Both are planning to remain members of Tallong RFS.

Cheryl was the long-term manager of Tallong General Store before its sale in 2017 and reincarnation as "The Midge". She was also responsible for re-establishing Tallong's ANZAC services which had been discontinued for several years. Distressed by the difficulty of closing the store to travel to Marulan to attend the service there, Cheryl approached the TCFG committee, and the rest, as we say, is history...

At the morning tea on the 25th, a large cake was cut, and gifts of flowers and a crabapple tree presented to wish Alan and Cheryl well and remind them of the village left behind.

ANZAC DAY 2021

On the 25th of April 1915, Australian and New Zealand troops landed on Turkey's Gallipoli Peninsula at around dawn on Sunday, the 25th of April 1915 - barely nine months after the outbreak of World War I. They became known as Anzacs and the pride they took in that name continues to this day.

It was the start of a campaign that lasted eight months and resulted in 26,111 Australian casualties, including 8,141 deaths. More than 100 years on, the Anzac spiril — with its ideals of courage, endurance and mateship, is still strong in our community. We take pause on ANZAC Day not to glorify war or praise victors, but to honour the service and sacrifice of our veterans, serving Defence personnel and their families.

This year, as Boral celebrates our 75th Anniversary, it is important we acknowledge the importance of our military veterans in the history and culture of Boral and our nation.

75 years ago - on the 4th of March 1946 - Boral was born. It was just six months after the official end of World War II: a time when Australia and the world was looking to rebuild and start dreaming again. David Craig, Boral's founder, was a true entrepreneur who led the push to create bitumen and oil-based products for the Australian market.

Our first employee was Jim Cornell who worked out of David's office in Bond St, Sydney. Once construction started on the first refinery, Boral started actively recruiting ex-navy men whose commissions had ended

- even though they didn't have a permanent role for them all yet. Good people were good people, and they would be needed soon enough.

'They'd all had war experience and were used to keep everything "shipshape" ... Wherever the navy people worked at the refinery the area was always kept spotless. If anything needed polishing, they polished it.' Jim Cornell, Boral's first employee

On Anzac Day, 25 April 2021, we remember the many veterans that formed much of the first operational workforce in the business.

It was a privilege to hold our own Dawn service at Peppertree Quarry and to attend both the Tallong and Marulan morning services to pay our respects.

Thank you to each and every veteran, serving Defence Force and emergency services person for your service and sacrifice, and thank you to the family members who sacrifice a great deal in enabling others to serve.

Lest we forget










