WINGELLO STOCKADE

Some years ago a lady called Mrs. Bunt lived at Tallong and she wrote a series of articles for "the Barbers Creek News" which was published by the Tallong School. One of Mrs. Bunt's memories was when she visited the old Wingello Stockade when she was a young girl. Her memoir is as follows:

"Just across the highway from the old Wingello Hotel was the "Lock-up" we called it. It was built of sandstone. It had very narrow cells and windows with bars. The stone steps were well worn down. Not far away was a sandstone cottage where the soldiers lived.

The "Whipping Tree" with a big ring was close by. The old people often spoke of seeing blue lights around it where they believed that some prisoners had died.

It was always an interesting place to visit. As children we would sit up on the rock near the highway and imagine that it was here that bushrangers held up the coaches.

We were told that "Nosey Bob" the hangman built a mansion down the coast but never lived in it. He had five daughters and none of them married.

Unfortunately, all of these buildings, the hotel, lock-up, and soldiers' cottage were all demolished. I could not help but feel it was a shame to see them go. They were still up and the cottage in a Sunday paper in 1928 or 1929."

The Wingello Stockade was established in 1834 and remained until the chained gang was sent to Towrang Stockade in 1839.

MACQUARIE'S DIARY

On 3rd April 1820 Gov. Macquarie instructed James Meehan as follows: "Being extremely anxious as soon as practicable the Quantity of Disposable Land fit for tillage and grazing some time discovered by Charles Throsby you are instructed to proceed thither for this purpose." Meehan set out on 14th April 1820, for the purpose of exploring the Wallandilly (spelt like that then). Later in the year Gov. Macquarie decided to make a tour of inspection of the new country himself.

He set out on 16th October from Parramatta. With him were Major Antill, Lieutenant Macquarie, Dr. Reid, Rev. Mr Cartwright & Mr. Throsby. They met up with Joseph Wild. ("Wild tells me they have completed the road to the top of Cookbundoon Range about 40 miles hence").

"Friday 20th October.....arrived at St. Patricks River (Paddy's River), a very pretty, clear little stream running Northerly – with a good bridge over it. About a mile from this rivulet we came to the Wollondilly River about 12 yards wide".

The Governor was then on Arthursleigh. His journal continues....." took Mr. Meehan with me to view Hannibal MacArthur's establishment about four miles from our camp".

On his return to Sydney Governor Macquarie issued a Government and General Order which permitted occupation of "the new country".

A message from the Mayor

Water Restrictions

From Monday 1st December all areas of Goulburn and Marulan with reticulated water will move to amber level water restrictions, which is the second level within Council's Water Use Policy.

The region has been on green level restrictions, which is our permanent water conservation level, with a target consumption of 270 litres per person per day.

Mayor Bob Kirk said the drought is hitting the region hard, and we all need to do our bit to conserve water as we head into what is predicted to be a hot summer.

"Residents of Goulburn Mulwaree are already very water wise, which is not surprising considering the severity of the drought we faced in the early 2000's. We are in a fortunate position with water supply security stronger than much of NSW at the moment.

"In comparison with most other cities and regions our residents do a great job, but Council is now asking the community to take extra steps to conserve our most important resource. Under amber level restrictions the target consumption is 230 litres per person per day.

"The Highland Source Pipeline is now being extensively utilised, which is just over 4 mega litres per day. This equates to over a third of our City's daily water use, and will be critically important to Goulburn if the drought continues throughout 2020"

Under amber level restrictions, use of Goulburn and Marulan water supply is restricted to:

- Hand held hose with a control nozzle or bucket can only be used between 5pm and 10am to water plants and lawns
- Watering systems and hose sprinklers can only be used between 5pm and 10am on weekends
- Paths, driveways and hard surfaces cannot be cleaned. In extraordinary circumstances for example following a health threatening incident, a hose can be used to assist to clean up
- Vehicles can be washed at any time on a lawn or porous surface using a hose with a control nozzle, bucket or low volume high pressure machine
- Private pools can only be filled when a water offset plan for that residence has been met, including the mandatory use of a pool cover when the pool is not in use. For further details see Council's Water Use Policy

The Water Use Policy has 3 distinct levels of permanent water conservation measures based on total storage volume and HSP bulk water transfer triggers. The three levels are green, amber and red - Council's policy has the full details of each level and is available to view on our website.

The Draft Strategy and Action Plan can be view during operating hours at the Council or Library, 184 Bourke Street, Goulburn or alternatively can be viewed online on the Council web page under "Public Exhibition".

Written submissions may be made at any time during the period of public exhibition, but must be submitted to Council before close of business Friday 31 January 2020.

Join us at 6pm, Friday 6 December to launch our new spaces and mark the opening of our summer exhibitions, 'Of the Sun' curated by Gina Mobayed, Aishah Kenton's 'Second Exit' and 'The Window' curated by the Gallery Volunteers.

'Of the Sun' brings together seven artists from across Australia - each of their distinct practices a rich contemplation of our relationship to the earth's natural elements and the role they can play in our personal journeys. The exhibition delves into an expanded understanding of the physical world through immersive experience and process, with practices across performance, painting and installation. 'Of the Sun' presents new commissions and key works from each artist, who as individuals are as bold and powerful as the work they make. Clothilde Bullen, Senior Curator of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Collections and Exhibitions at the Museum of Contemporary Art Australia, will open the exhibition.

Southern Tablelands Rail User Group

STRUG representatives met with an advisor for Regional Transport Minister Paul Toole. We gave him a submission which covered a number of issues. We asked for a variation to the diesel train contract to include tilt train technology. We made it clear that we are not against the governments desire for track upgrading but we understand that it will take many years, probably decades, and regional NSW needs shorter travel times now.

We also asked the Minister to schedule the morning Opal card services (Endeavour trains) to more suitable times. Our survey indicated that passengers wanted to arrive in Sydney between 9.30-10am and the early service at a time to get them into Sydney for an 8.30am start again. Anyone with an 8.30am start on the current timetable has to drive to Moss Vale. There has been an Endeavour train on standby at Moss Vale for some months now and we have asked for this train to run a shuttle service between Moss Vale and Goulburn during the week and we have asked for the 8.20am service which departs Goulburn over the Christmas-New Year weekend timetable to be permanent year round with the 4pm from Sydney extended to Goulburn in the afternoon. We have suggested that a morning commuter service from Moss Vale to Canberra be run with a return afternoon service. This would help to open the Canberra job market up to Southern Tablelands and Highlands residents.

We are worried that not enough Intercity diesel trains have been ordered in the new contract to provide the current service levels let alone running any new services. We currently have 14 Endeavour Intercity trains and the new order only calls for 10 new trains.


This year's raffle proceeds will go to drought relief. The Lions' members also collected donations during the week at the BP service stations.

A MONTH IN THE COUNTRY

DECEMBER 2019

TO DO THIS MONTH ...

continue weeding & dead heading water new & young plants as necessary

LOOK out for PESTS on roses!
FINISH pruning spring-flowering shrubs CUT back & tidy up perennials PLANT out summer annuals-MOW the lawn (what lawn!) and trim edges regularly. GIVE tired and sad lawns a boost with a liquid feed. HARVEST vegetables as they come to maturity

PLANT slow-maturing winter crops such as leeks. KEEP fruit & vegetables well watered if you can during the dry time

SHADE plants from extreme heat PLANT out vegetables such as tomatoes & capsicum to get good crops this season.

Last month we featured the small water tank from Bunnings around 300 litres. Just think, that is around 30 watering cans or around 10 litres per can of water for your plants, or, 5 litres per plant. Yes, it is a lot slower than using the hose but ... it's water wise and that's very important in these very, very dry times.


PLANTS THAT BEAT THE HEAT ...

We'll shortly be seeking approval for a modification of Peppertree Quarry's planning consent (our sixth), designed to improve air quality and dust management outcomes associated with our crushing and screening plants. Through 'MOD 6', we'll ask the NSW Department of Planning, Industry and Environment (DPIE) to endorse the replacement of our existing air filtration systems with two 'baghouse' filters and associated ducting.

A baghouse works by drawing air containing particulates in through a 'hopper' before being directed to filter bags. The bags capture suspended particulates, while the now clean air is pushed through an outlet. Bags are



routinely cleaned, with the removed material mixed with water and emplaced in an approved overburden area

The proposed baghouse will be located within the existing processing area and will not require any significant changes to operations. We'll be seeking to lodge the application with DPIE in the lead up to Christmas.



Tallong Twitterings



Midway through its 100th year, Tallong's War Memorial Hall is still the centre of community activities.

Since it was opened in May 1920, it has seen dances and wedding receptions, farewells and commemorations. It sheltered the community during and after the disastrous 1965 Chatsbury bushfire and has been the scene of many a card night and school concert even, during the 1970s, hosting local children roller skating on the polished floor. Only one unfortunate incident has been publically recorded when, after a village social in January 1935 while Messrs Davenport and Hoare were counting the takings, two men reached through the pigeon hole into the office and attempted to grab some of the silver! Mr Davenport (described in the newspaper report as "although not a young man") gave chase but the miscreants got away.


In the early 1920s the Tallong Horticultural Society held an annual Flower Show in the Hall and this morphed into Tallong

Agricultural and Horticultural Show which despite being discontinued during World War 2, was reinstated in the 1950s and continued for some years. Now of course we have the annual Apple Day Festival on the first Sunday in May.

Until June 1973, the Hall was run by a locally elected Hall committee. After this time the NSW Department of Lands took over with trustees being appointed for periods of 5 years (with the possibility of extension). The original trustees, appointed as of 15 June 1973 were: Joan Margaret Grace, June Margaret Lucre and Ethel Joan Johnston with Jean C. Bunt being appointed an additional trustee in August 1975. In June 1981, these trustees were replaced by Suzanne Maria Montgomery, Heinz Muenster and Kerry Ann Randazzo with Russell William Montgomery replacing Heinz Muenster in 1986. One of the suggestions that has been put forward to celebrate the centenary of the opening of the Hall next year is a new honour board to be erected commemorating the service of all the Hall Trust members to the Tallong community.

In the meantime, on Friday 6 December 2019, starting at 7pm, the old walls will resound with "Rootsy Rock N Roll" when Harry Hookey and his Desert Alien Band, supported by Southern Highlands local, Jo Caseley, return for one night only. Tallong Hall is a favourite with both Harry and Jo for its enthusiastic audiences and great acoustics. Tickets are \$25 per head and BYO your own drink and food. 
