

#### **Christmas Waste Hours**

The Marulan Waste Management Centre will be open from 8 am to 12 noon on Tuesday 27th December 2016 as the centre is closed Sunday and Monday for Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

This will provide a convenient opportunity for residents to dispose of their Christmas waste. Please keep wrapping paper and boxes separate for disposal at recycling bays.

#### **Bushfire Season**

We are now coming into summer, and with it comes bushfire season. Please take twenty minutes with your family to discuss what you'll do during a fire, you could save their lives, as well as your home.

Step 1 – Discuss what to do if a bushfire threatens your home

Step 2 - Prepare your home and get it ready for bushfire season (keep the grass low and gutters clean for example)

Step 3 - Know the bushfire alert levels (watch the NSW RFS website and download the 'Fires Near Me' app)

Step 4 – Keep all the bushfire information numbers, websites and the smartphone app.

#### **Road Safety over Christmas**

Below are some road safety tips from Tracey Norberg (our Road Safety Officer at council). Please take your time on road trips over the Christmas period, and ensure you make it to your destination in one piece.

To ensure you get to your destination safely here are a few tips:

- Prepare your car trailer and caravan have it serviced and check you're prepared for emergencies with a blanket, torch and first aid kit.
- Prepare yourself be rested before a long drive, plan the trip so you share the driving and take regular breaks to avoid fatigue. Keep an eye out for the signs of driver fatigue which may include yawning, tired eyes, poor concentration and slow reactions. Have a 15-minute rest every two hours. Take advantage of the Driver Reviver stops.
- If you plan to have a drink- plan not to drive. In NSW drink driving is a factor in about one in five accidents where someone loses their life. Have a Plan B.
- · If you have children in the car, ensure they are in the appropriate child restraint.
- If you're travelling with pets, make sure they're restrained for everybody's safety.

Before you head off, it's a good idea to check out what's happening on the roads you plan to travel on. The RMS website provides live traffic reports which are up-dated regularly from the RMS's Traffic Management Centre (TMC).

The TMC manages incidents, such as crashes, and other disruptions to the road network, such as special events.





The Chamber has had another spurt of growth with three new members; a welcome addition to our growing organisation.

November saw the restart of the Marulan Markets. The Chamber was instrumental in finding a person to run it as a business. Although not connected to the Chamber, we think it important that the markets continue as it brings new people into the town. The markets will be held on the second Sunday of each month. ### **Thomas Brown**

Thomas Brown and perhaps more importantly his wife Mary are an integral part of Marulan's history.

Although Thomas received all the kudos – he built the White Horse Inn at the Wingello Stockade and has an extremely large headstone, restored and standing in pride of place at the Marulan Historical Society. It was his widow Mary who following his death (it is reported that the was accidentally shot) married Edward Carrigan and had four more children, she already had seven.

She realised that with the coming of the railway, Marulan was the place to be and operated the Duke of Edinburgh. Unfortunately, this building was burnt to the ground in the 1970's. Once again widowed, Marry Corrigan purchased land in 1872 on which she later built the Royal Hotel which typifies our town.



#### Vale - Nell Emerton

Although saddened by the death of Nell Emerton, her passing has brought back many happy memories of the great time we all had. Especially when she and her husband, Greg, were members of the Marulan Lions Club. Nell was also Treasurer for the CWA when they moved into their new rooms in 1968.

He was so impressed with her that he offered her a job and for many years she showed his cattle at the Royal Sydney Show. Nell really enjoyed this, even sleeping in the stalls with them. Another of her great pleasures was when she and Greg, along with friends, went by "convoy" in their horse drawn vehicles to places like Swallow Tail.

It was whilst she was working at Greenwich Park that she met her husband Greg and, following their marriage, they had two daughters Judy and Alyson. Nell also had one granddaughter.

Nell was a popular member of the staff at Ampol Roadhouse and those who worked with her still recall the fun they all had. We send our sincere sympathy to them all.

A stable and coach house were built at a later time. Mrs Thomas also chose the name "All Saints" for the Anglican Church.

Despite her laying of the foundation stone and choosing the name of the church, I have failed to find out what her Christian name was. She is described as Mrs Thomas, wife of Mesic Thomas, in everything I have read.



#### Rail / Coach Service

As a regular passenger on the daily rail/coach service between Marulan and Goulburn I read with interest a past article in the Goulburn Post in this regard.

I must say I find this morning service excellent (time for attending a doctor's appointment, lunch with friends etc). Travel between Goulburn to Sydney is also really good. Five trains that stop at Marulan to Sydney during the day and four trains stopping on the return trip.

My only complaint is travel between Marulan and Canberra. To get to Canberra I have to travel to Bundanoon very early in the morning, wait about an hour and half, catch the Canberra Explorer to Canberra and, on return, get off at Goulburn and wait two hours for a train that stops at Marulan.



I would not recommend this to anyone as the last time I did, I caught an old passenger train (no blue handles, that is important) and when I went to get out at Marulan, it was two feet from the platform and two feet to jump down. I had nothing to hold onto (or swing from).

I did write to our local member who passed my letter onto the appropriate department and received a polite letter back saying "bad luck" or words to that effect. But I still think that this train could stop at Marulan as Bundanoon is a "pick up/set down" station and that's what I think Marulan should be as I am always the only person to get on at Bundanoon, so what's the difference?

And they would know they had to stop at Marulan as you have to book on this train. I might add that Mittagong, Bowral, Tarago and Bungendore are also "pick up/set down" stations.

And I am sure that the Marulan senior citizens (and others) would love a day out in Canberra as the train leaves Canberra on its return at 5.25 pm.

I will try and go along to the next meeting in this regard at Marulan, but after going to meetings for over forty years I now try to leave meetings to others!

#### **MARULAN VOLUNTEERS**

Who are we? We are a group of local residents trying to improve the appearance of our town.

Why do we do this? If our town looks appealing and cared for, this will attract visitors who will support our local businesses. It also makes it a better environment for us to live in as locals.

What do we do? Local council mows the town's parks and some of its nature strips, but doesn't have the resources to do much more than this. ### Tallong Twitterings



### In December, all thoughts turn towards Christmas celebrations....

In the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> centuries, and associated with the coming of the railway age, a number of Goulburn organisations held Christmas picnics at Tallong (or Barbers Creek as it was then known) which extraordinary numbers of people attended. Some were, perhaps, less successful than others. A picnic organised by the Loyal Argyle Lodge of the Grand United Order of Oddfellows at *Glenrock* on Boxing Day 1893 attracted 2000 people with 2 trains, both of 16 carriages, being chartered to carry them.

The Goulburn Herald reported that 'the excursionists either indulged in various games or betook themselves to the Glenrock Waterfalls to view the scenery and gather the beautiful ferns which abound there'. Unfortunately, one young man fell down the cliffs and suffered a compound fracture of the leg. A doctor staying at Glenrock was able to assist and an incoming train was stopped to return the patient to Goulburn, after the Barbers Creek station master (who was at the picnic) ran 4 miles to the station to alert the driver.

In another incident, a local resident discovered some youths raiding his orchard and was later assaulted by them and their friends. A number were arrested. However, the rest of the picnickers were entertained with a merry-go-round and swinging boats while various athletics events were run during the course of the day and members of the Goulburn City Band provided music for dancing.

During the early 20<sup>th</sup> century, Tallong was a preferred destination for Sunday School picnics from all denominations. In 1901, for example, it was the turn of the Goldsmith Street Wesleyan Sunday School. The *Goulburn Evening Penny Post* wrote that 'the children attending the Sunday School marched in procession from Goldsmith Street [to the railway station] headed by the Salvation Army Band...There were about 350 school children and a staff of nearly 50 teachers'. All up about 1000 people were carried on what was described as 'one of the heaviest picnic trains that has been dispatched from Goulburn'.

Once again athletics events were organised for the children and transport was available to transport visitors to Badgery's Lookout, then known as the Shoalhaven Look Down but the day was very hot and many picnickers were content to remain under the trees near Barbers Creek.

Tallong was certainly a popular picnic spot for celebrations at Christmas one hundred years ago and in keeping with this tradition the Tallong RFS brigade and the TCFG offer to the people of Tallong a Christmas party on the 3<sup>rd</sup> of December, 2016 from 12 noon to 2 pm in the Hall and Memorial Park.

The RFS barbeque and pavlova pudding are an enjoyable part of the Christmas fare with Santa arriving on the Fire Truck to distribute goodies to the children who also play prize winning games. At this year's Christmas Party, the TCFG was planning to include a celebration of the opening of the Memorial Park refurbishment project which includes the erection of the big Apple structure. Unfortunately, wet weather and obstacles to contractors keeping to the original timelines were encountered and we now must move the opening ceremony to May 2017 as part of the Apple Day Festival.

### The Garden Guru

The gardens are blooming and looking nice and fresh before all the heat that summer brings. The windy weather has played havoc with so keep up with mulching and watering. Water early morning or evening. Add soil wetter to your gardens to hold in the moisture. When you are almost ready to harvest quick growing plants such as lettuce or radish, to keep up the supply, replant. Spring and summer flowering bulbs should be left in the ground until the leaves dry off before dividing next year. Keep dead heading the flowers to promote flowering.

Snails are prevalent in the gardens now. They can be deterred with caffeine spray or pet safe pellets. Sawdust will also deter them though you will need to add nitrogen to the soil to counteract it. Or just go out in the garden early morning and pick them up and dispose of them.

Sunburn can cause some distress when out in the garden so wear a hat and use sunscreen. To protect your skin from insect attack such as bush flies and mosquitos with insect repellent. Try planting rue, wormwood or tansy around outdoor living areas.

If you are going away over the holiday period, arrange a friend to water and pick any vegetables. Indoor plants can be kept moist by watering well then covering each plant and pot with a plastic bag tied firmly around the container.



### The Creative Cook

#### **Christmas Stuffing**

As we approach the holiday season, when we celebrate with family and friends, many of us like to stuff a turkey or chook or a combination of both.....a churkey?

Delight your guests with this super easy, home made, stovetop stuffing. It tastes so much better than commercially made packet stuff....ing.

### Ingredients

10 slices bread, diced into small cubes

1/4 cup butter, melted

3 garlic cloves, minced

1 onion, diced

2 carrots, peeled and diced

2 stalks celery, diced

½ teaspoon dried sage

½ teaspoon dried thyme

1/4 teaspoon dried rosemary

Salt and pepper, to taste

1 cup chicken stock

2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley

#### Method

- 1. Preheat over to 180 degrees C.
- 2. Spread bread cubes on slightly greased baking paper. Bake in the over until crisp and golden; about 4-5 minutes. Set aside.
- 3. Melt butter in a large pan over a medium heat. Add garlic, onion, carrots and celery. Cook, stirring occasionally, until tender; about 3-4 minutes. Stir in sage, thyme and rosemary until fragrant; about 1 minute.
- 4. Stir in bread cubes and gently toss to combine. Stir in chicken stock and parsley. Cover and remove from heat. Let sit for 10 minutes.
- 5. Serve immediately.

#### **Avenues of Remembrance for Goulburn**

Remembrance Day has just passed and as summer approaches and new growth emerges, the Avenue of Remembrance Working Party is preparing to make their submission to the Goulburn Mulwaree Council.

The brief for the Working Party was to liaise with the Street Working Party. They have investigated options and are making recommendations to Council on a programme to implement and plant avenues of trees to honour, recognise and commemorate Goulburn residents that have served in all wars since the 19<sup>th</sup> century. It is proposed that the Avenues of Remembrance could either be on a road reserve or any other prominent Council land, clearly and appropriately reflecting the recognition that is deserved for Goulburn's servicemen and women, both past and present.

The Avenue of Remembrance Working Party greatly appreciates the foundational work undertaken by the Street Trees Working Party. The Street Tree Working Party put considerable time into researching suitable tree species for the respective roads into and out of Goulburn that are being suggested to Council as suitable locations for the Avenues.

While comprising members of the Street Tree Working Party, the Avenue of Remembrance Working Party includes additional members including the instigator of the concept, now Mayor Bob Kirk, Dr. Claire Baddeley, Goulburn Mulwaree Council Museums Officer – St Clair and Rocky Hill and two members of the Goulburn RSL sub-branch.

The Avenue of Remembrance Working Party will also be nominating nine local roads to represent the contributions from various areas of operation of the Australian Defence Force. They will also be suggesting the Council reinvigorate sections of the original Park Road, Eastgrove, Avenue of Honour, which was initially planted in 1919.

The proposed Avenues project will be a valuable addition to the city, adding to its attractiveness, while recognising and commemorating the contribution of Goulburn Mulwaree residents to the military service and history of Australia.

#### **Avoid Renovation Roulette**

Goulburn Mulwaree renovators may unwittingly be gambling with their lives by carrying out renovations without an understanding of asbestos essentials. As part of National Asbestos Awareness Month, Goulburn Mulwaree Council is urging home renovators to avoid the risks, arm themselves with basic information and, when appropriate, access expert advice.

Mayor Bob Kirk encouraged investors and renovators to ensure they are educated and don't take unnecessary risk. "Home renovators need to take the time to manage risk; educate yourself, take precautions and always seek professional advice when you are unsure." There are three simple rules of thumb for would-be renovators and the general community which take the uncertainty out of dealing with asbestos in the home:

- If intact, there is no need to panic as asbestos can remain safely in place, undisturbed and painted or otherwise sealed
- If unsure whether a material is asbestos, assume it is asbestos and take appropriate precautions. There are
  many different types of asbestos and it is difficult to identify by sight. Bring in someone who is trained and
  accredited
- If broken, damaged, disturbed or mishandled, asbestos fibers can become loose and airborne, posing a risk. Limit access to the area and contact someone who is trained and accredited in asbestos removal.

### **Regional Community Strategic Plan**





### **HOT DOGS**

The Australian summer can be a strain on humans and animals alike! Excessive body temperature is uncomfortable at best, and long periods of high body temperatures are likely to create dehydration and may even damage organs. Here are some tactics to keep your pet cool and comfortable this summer.

Tips and Tricks

\*\*\*ALWAYS ENSURE THERE IS PLENTY OF CLEAN, FRESH WATER AVAILABLE\*\*\*



- Clean water must be available to your pet 24/7!
- Limit walks and runs to cool mornings and evenings; hot concrete burns paw pads and your dog
  may not tell you they're too hot while they're having fun.
- Frozen Treats can be made from broth, pet-safe juice and fruits, raw beef or even just water!
- Tiles create the same effect as cool concrete -keep them shaded; these surfaces heat up in the sun.

#### Overheating

Exercise, excitement, and genetics can all increase the risk of overheating. "Smushed face" or brachycephalic breed pets are at **especially high risk** because they do not cool their bodies as efficiently as other breeds do.

Early signs of overheating are easy to catch and include: \*Heavy Panting \*Lethargy \*Dehydration

If your pet doesn't cool down, they can get Heat Stroke. Signs of Heat Stroke include:

\*Disorientation \*Diarrhoea \*Vomiting \*Seizures \*Coma \*Possibly Death What to do to cool your pet down:

- Bring your pet in to a cool location and provide cool fresh water
- Apply cool water or methylated spirits to their ears, paws and also in armpit/inguinal regions
- Drape wet towels over the pet in front of a fan or air conditioner
- If cooling your pet in these ways does not begin to work within 5-10 minutes OR if you see signs of
  Heat Stroke, OR your pet's rectal temperature exceeds 40°C, immediately go to a veterinarian!!
  Your pet may require fluid therapy or other rescue methods to cool their body on the inside and
  the outside. If damage has already been done, this will also need to be addressed.

Summertime is great for the outdoors, but play safe! Your pet needs your help to stay cool!

Up early for day two of Singapore. On our list is the Cricket Club, Raffles, Tiger Balm gardens, pick up shirts and collect a car to drive around Malaysia.

We hurry through the crowd, grab a taxi and ask to be taken to the Singapore Cricket Club, established in 1852. It was the mecca for expats like those at the Raffles Hotel. Gaining admission was a problem. As members of the Sydney Cricket Ground, we felt sure we had reciprocal rights but a very English Indian was having none of it. We were about to retire gracefully when an expat Aussie sitting in the foyer stated he would sign us in as he was a member.

We sat on the terrace that overlooks the impressive oval and wicket. We had a cuppa and a cucumber sandwich served on a silver tray; very English. The old man who poured our tea could have been at the club's launch 160 years ago.

Still trying to keep to our schedule we take off for the Raffles Hotel. Seated in the courtyard of the hotel, having ordered our Singapore Slings, we soak up the history of the place. We can see billiard tables under which a hunter had shot a Sumatran Tiger. A list of who's who on the guest list: Kings, Queens, famous explorers, writers, Generals and heads of state.

But we can't stay. We must hurry to pick up the shirts and we can't wait for the pop-up food to start. The rental car can wait till morning to take us to Malacca; our first stop in Malaysia.

So we decide an afternoon nap is appropriate and dream of the food stalls and delights. Later on, we sit at a table surrounded by the buzz of the food stalls. Infront of us is a plate covered in picked-clean-crabshells of the most delectable Chili Crab. We take in the atmosphere and talk about the adventure ahead and the sites and tastes of Malaysia. 

Artist books are artworks in the form of a book. Artist books transcend the traditional notions of art; often crossing many art disciplines such as drawing, painting and sculpture.

In this all day Masterclass, you will learn some artist book building techniques from regional artist Fran Ifould. You will be provided with instruction notes and guidance on each activity. During the workshop you will create a concertina book and a sewn book of several pages using a Coptic binding. It is envisioned that workshop participants will take their knowledge back to their home or studio to continue working with the art form.

Participants will need to bring or buy their own lunch which is scheduled for 1-2pm.
